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The new house continues to slowly crumble around us, and it would appear that despite considerable effort and expense it's now probably in *slightly* worse shape than when we purchased it about a year and a half ago.

Last month a gentleman spent three excruciating days jack-hammering up the kitchen floor in an effort to determine why firstly the washing machine, and subsequently all other water-based devices (toilets aside – small mercies appreciated!) had decided to vent into the kitchen instead of the drains. - 1. **HAROLD ACTON**. *The Last Medici*. Faber 1932. First edition. 8vo. 358pp. With a frontispiece and fifteen illustrations. Publisher's top edge stain faded, and the top and fore edges lightly spotted. Former owner name and date inked to the head of the front pastedown (and almost entirely obscured by the wrapper flap). A very good copy in the uncommon dust wrapper, nicked with a little loss to the spine panel ends and to several other extremities, and with some light toning and several small areas of surface abrasion, partly impacting the lettering. The author's first historical book, an account of Florence in the last days of House of Medici, accepted by Faber on the condition that some 30,000 were cut, which Acton notes "cost me almost as much labour as writing the book." £125
- 2. **ERIC AMBLER**. *The Jealous God*. The Bodley Head 1964. First edition of this pre-publication extract from Ambler's novel *A Kind of Anger*, which was limited to 200 copies produced as a Christmas gift for the publisher. This copy **inscribed** on the half title by John [Ryder], and with the publisher's folding Christmas greetings slip laid-in, also signed by John Ryder (the noted typographer and art director of The Bodley Head for thirty years). Slim 8vo. 16pp sewn into unprinted stiff card wrappers with an integral dust wrapper. The wrappers just fractionally faded at the natural fold. A virtually fine copy. £75
- 3. **KINGSLEY AMIS**. A Case of Samples. Poems 1946-1956. Victor Gollancz Ltd. 1956. First edition. 8vo. 72pp. The spine lettering just fractionally dulled. Former owner name and date neatly inked to the head of the front free endpaper. A virtually fine copy in very good dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel and with several tiny millimetres of loss to the spine panel ends. Forty-five poems, a generous selection of his early verse including a number from his debut collection *Bright November*, much of his second collection A Frame of Mind, all six from his 1954 Fantasy Press collection, and many others hitherto unprinted in bookform. £40
- 4. **MARGARET ATWOOD** contributes her five-part poem *Trainride, Vienna-Bonn* to a special 'Canadian issue' of the periodical *Aquarius*. No. 13/14, 1981/82. Edited by Eddie Linden. 8vo. Card wrappers featuring a colour design by Ralph Steadman. In virtually fine state. Probably the first appearance in print of Atwood's political poem, which was subsequently included in her collection *True Stories*, where the title was slightly altered to *Train Ride*, *Vienna-Bonn*. £10
- 5. **W.H.AUDEN. Richard Hoggart.** Auden. An Introductory Essay. Chatto & Windus 1951. First edition. This copy **inscribed by the author** on the title page: "Richard Hoggart in Norwich 23/20/01" (the recipient being poet and critic Anthony Thwaite, with his name pencilled to the head of the front free endpaper). 8vo. 256pp. The cloth very lightly marked and dusty, with a little quite light spotting to several preliminary and concluding leaves. Quite a nice bright copy. No dust wrapper. The author's first book, and the first full-length study of Auden's work, published whilst he was still a staff tutor at the University of Hull. £25
- 6. **W.H.AUDEN**. The Prolific and the Devourer. Antaeus / The Ecco Press, New York 1981. First edition the casebound issue. Large 8vo. 93pp + xix advertisements. A touch of toning to the cloth, and the tips of two corners fractionally rubbed. A very good copy in very good dust wrapper. The first complete printing of Auden's lengthy four-part book of aphorisms and reflections (written in the summer 1939 during his first months in America and subsequently abandoned) here occupies the entirety of issue 42 of the quarterly periodical Antaeus. £20
- 7. **W.H.AUDEN.** *Juvenilia. Poems* 1922-1928. Edited with a lengthy introduction and textual notes by Katherine Bucknell. Princeton University Press, Princeton 1994. First edition. 8vo. lxxii, 263pp. A fine copy in dust wrapper, lightly faded at the spine panel. A collection of over two hundred poems, mostly hitherto unprinted, penned between 1922-1928 when Auden was between fifteen and twenty-one years old. £20

- 8. **PAUL AUSTER. Jacques Dupin**. Fits and Starts. Selected Poems of Jacques Dupin. Translated from the French and with an introduction by Paul Auster. Living Hand 2, Connecticut, 1974. The first English-language edition, printed by the Compton Press and limited to 1,000 numbered copies (although it would appear that none of them were actually numbered). 8vo. 71pp. Lettered card wrappers with French flaps. Very good indeed. This is generally considered to be Auster's second book following his verse collection *Unearth*, although strictly speaking *Living Hand* was a periodical, issued "several times a year". £75
- 9. **AVIATION.** Commander Charles Lamb. War in a Stringbag. Cassell 1977. First edition. A presentation copy, inscribed by the author on the title verso, dated the year after publication, and with a signed typewritten letter to the same recipient laid-in. 8vo. 340pp. With mapillustrated endpapers and nearly thirty photographs. A tiny specking to spotting to the top edge. Very good indeed in dust wrapper, with a small crease to the head of the spine, and some fading to the publisher's red spine panel lettering. The author's WW2 aviation memoirs. £35
- 10. **AVIATION. Frederick Walker**. Aërial Navigation. A Practical Handbook on the Construction of Dirigible Balloons, Aërostats, Aëroplanes, and Aëromotors. Crosby Lockwood & Son 1902. First edition. 8vo. xvi, 151pp + xlviii publisher's catalogue and xvi publisher's list. "With about one hundred illustrations". Publisher's price notice tipped to the front free endpaper, as required. Some bruising to the backstrip ends, and just a tiny trace of wear to several corner tips. Former owner name and several numerals to the half-title verso. A very good copy of this early work on the theory, practice and development of aviation (somewhat heavy on the umlauts). £95
- 11. **B.B.** / **D.J.WATKINS PITCHFORD.** The Little Grey Man. A Story for the Young in Heart. With illustrations by the author. Eyre & Spottiswoode 1942. First edition. 8vo. xii, 203pp. With a frontispiece, 19 full-page drawings, and 34 head and tail pieces. A short tear to the base of the front free endpaper. A very good copy in somewhat worn and handled dust wrapper: dust marked, nicked and creased, with an inch of loss from the base of the spine panel and some internal taped repair. The author's delightful Carnegie Medal-winning children's fantasy. £200
- 12. **JOHN BALE. Barry B.Adams.** *John Bale's King John.* Edited with an introduction and notes by Barry B.Adams. The Huntington Library, California 1969. First edition, designed and printed at Princeton University Press. Tall 8vo. ix, 211pp. Top edge lightly spotted. A virtually fine copy in very slightly toned and rubbed dust wrapper with a tiny subsequent price sticker to the head of the front flap. A new edition of the Tudor playwright's most important work, based on a firsthand study of the original manuscript held by the Huntington Library, and enhanced with copious scholarly notes. Seemingly not published in the UK. £30
- 13. **JULIAN BARNES**. *Arthur & George*. A novel. Jonathan Cape 2005. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 360pp. In virtually fine state. No dust wrapper, as issued, but with original vertical wrap-around band to the rear board. A fascinating account of the 'Great Wyrley Outrages' and relationship between George Edalji, imprisoned for a crime he did not commit, and Arthur Conan Doyle, who strove for years to clear Edalji's name and uncover the true culprit. Rightfully short-listed for the Booker Prize. £25
- 14. **H.E.BATES**. A Threshing Day. A story. W and G.Foyle Ltd., "At the Sign of the Trefoyle" 1931. First edition, limited to 300 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #145). Slim 8vo. 32pp. Buckram at the backstrip very lightly faded and with just the faintest trace of toning to the free endpapers. A very good copy, lacking the unprinted glassine protector. The first bookform appearance of this twenty-six page Bates story, which first appeared in a 1930 issue of John O'London's Weekly (under the title A Threshing Day for Esther), and was subsequently included in the collection The Black Boxer Tales (1932). £95

- 15. **H.E.BATES**. *The Duet*. A story. Grayson & Grayson, 'The Grayson Books' series 1935. First edition, limited to 285 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #35). Slim 8vo. Unpaginated [40pp]. With vellum endpapers decorated with the series design, and two small drawings by Joy Lloyd. The tip of one corner bumped. Edges lightly spotted, with some further spotting to several preliminary leaves and to occasional text leaf margins. Very good in good dust wrapper, tanned and marked, and chipped at several extremities with small areas of loss. A twenty-three page Bates' story, which was never collected and re-issued in bookform, although it did subsequently appear in a November 1940 issue of the periodical *Agrosy*. £95
- 16. **H.E.BATES** contributes his story *Good Luck, Nastashya* to the uncommon anthology *London Calling. A Salute to America*. Edited with an introduction by Storm Jameson. Harper & Brothers, New York and London 1942. First edition. 8vo. vi, 322pp. Contemporary (1944) former owner name boldly inked to the front free endpaper. Endpapers and pastedowns lightly spotted. A very good coy. No dust wrapper. A most uncommon anthology with wide-ranging contributions, issued to celebrate America's entry into the Second World War. The first appearance in print of this Bates story (not noted by Eads), which was only ever reprinted once (under the title *Happy Christmas Nastashya*) in the December 1942 issue of the *Royal Air Force Journal*, one month after this November 1942 bookform appearance (the Harper printing code [K-R] suggests publication was October 1942, but most bibliographies state a November 1942 publication date). Other contributors include Rebecca West, Walter de la Mare, J.B.Priestley, Osbert Sitwell, John Masefield, E.M.Forster, Edmund Blunden, Bonamy Dobrée, Frank Swinnerton, E.M.Delafield, Robert Graves, T.S.Eliot, Edith Sitwell, Captain Liddell Hart, C.Day Lewis, Dorothy L.Sayers, Rose Macaulay and others. An elusive title, the only copy we have ever come across. £200
- 17. **H.E.BATES** contributes his three-page essay *They Have Left the Farm* to an issue of the periodical *Royal Air Force Journal*. Vol. 3, No. 12, December 1945. Slim 8vo. Pictorial stapled card wrappers, very lightly soiled. A very good copy. A follow-up to Bates' October 1944 essay *My Grandfather's Farm*, printed in the same publication. This essay never reprinted. £25
- 18. **H.E.BATES.** The Tinkers of Elstow. The Story of the Royal Ordnance Factory Managed by J.Lyons & Company Limited for the Ministry of Supply During the World War of 1939-1945. With Illustrations by Randolph Schwabe J.Lyons & Co. Ltd. [1946]. First edition, limited to 300 numbered copies printed on handmade paper and **signed by the author and the illustrator**. Slim 8vo. 50pp. Full blue leather. Corner tips and spine ends a little rubbed and bruised, and with a touch of light marking to the boards. Very good. No dust wrapper called for. £95
- 19. **NINA BAWDEN**. *Carrie's War*. A novel. With illustrations and a dust wrapper design by Faith Jaques. Victor Gollancz 1973. First edition. 8vo. 159pp. With fifteen chapter header illustrations by Faith Jacques plus an additional three-colour dust wrapper illustration. Half a dozen tiny pinpricks of spotting to the top edge and a shade of near-invisible partial toning to the free endpapers. A virtually fine copy in fine price-clipped dust wrapper. A super copy of the author's most acclaimed and widely-read work, partly inspired by her own experiences as an evacuee during the Second World War. £225
- 20. **HILAIRE BELLOC**. *The Chanty of the Nona*. A poem with music and drawings by the author. Faber & Gwyer, 'Ariel Poems' series 1928. The deluxe 'large paper' issue, printed on handmade paper and limited to 500 numbered copies **signed by the author** (this being #223). Slim 8vo. Unpaginated. School library plate to the front pastedown, but no further indications of institutional ownership. A trace of fading to the head of the rear board, and two short enclosed slits to the spine. The ghost of a partially erased former owner name to the head of the front free endpaper. A good bright copy. Belloc's five-verse poem is accompanied by two drawings and a page of music, issued here as the ninth number of the Ariel Poems series (and the only one where the text and images are contributes to the same individual). Not noted by Cahill. £65

- ALAN BENNETT. Forty Years On. A play. Faber 1969. First edition the card wrapper issue. A presentation copy, inscribed by the author at the head of the half-title: "To Victor Ross with all best wishes from Alan Bennett". Ross was the CEO of Reader's Digest and a noted bibliophile. Laid-in is a postcard from Bennett, presumably to the same recipient: "A pleasure and I'm so sorry about the smudge. Alan Bennett. I can't bear to think how long ago it is either". The smudge in question is a small ink-blemish a little below his half-title inscription. Slim 8vo. 78pp. Unprinted card wrappers with an integral dust wrapper. A small slip pasted to the front flap corrects the printed name of the cover image photographer. A trace of very light wear to several extremities and some light toning and dust soiling to the rear wrapper. A very good copy of this early Bennett play his first West End production. It features a play-within-a-play which includes a satire of T.E.Lawrence, here 'Tee Hee Lawrence', ("Clad in the magnificent white silk robes of an Arab prince...he hoped to pass unnoticed through London. Alas he was mistaken"). Uncommon with the author's inscription. £150
- 22. **JOHN BETJEMAN AND HUGH CASSON.** A Handbook on Paint. Colour and Controversy. The Silicate Paint Co. 1939. First edition. Slim 8vo. 48pp. Paper-covered boards. With a colour frontispiece illustration and four unaccredited colour plates. Betjeman contributes his seven-page essay Colour and the Interior Decorator which he concludes with seven 'general rules', the final and certainly most important of which is "Avoid most shades of brown". Hugh Casson contributes an essay, with further text contributed by the publisher. The boards fractionally marked in places, with some fading to the backstrip lettering. Some spotting to the endpapers and to half-a-dozen preliminary and concluding leaves. A very good copy of this early and most uncommon Betjeman item. Peterson B8 / Gammond 39S1. £250
- 23. **JOHN BETJEMAN**. *The English Town in the Last Hundred Years*. Cambridge University Press, Cambridge 1956. First edition of Betjeman's 1956 Rede Lecture, which was delivered at Senate House, Cambridge on 9 May 1956. Small 8vo. 28pp sewn into plain wrappers with an integral dust wrapper. A trace of light marking and creasing to the wrappers. Very good. £10
- 24. **JOHN BETJEMAN**. Archie and the Strict Baptists. With illustrations by Phillida Gili. John Murray 1977. First edition. 4to. [28pp]. A minor slant to the binding, else a fine copy in dust wrapper, clipped and re-priced by the publisher, lifting a fraction at the edges and with a single tiny tear. The story of Archibald Ormsby-Gore, a strict Baptist teddy bear from Uffington with a curious obsession with Aneucapnic lamps, penned by Betjeman for his family and originally accompanied by his own rough sketches, which are here delightfully reinterpreted by Phillida Gili (Reynolds Stone's daughter). £45
- 25. **LAURENT BINET**. *HHhH*. A novel. Translated from the French by Sam Taylor. Harvill Secker 2012. The first English edition. 8vo. A small area of very light staining to the top, impacting the upper margin of a score or so of leaves. A very good copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. The author's debut novel, an account of Operation Anthropoid, which resulted in the assassination of Reinhard Heydrich in Prague during WW2. £25
- 26. **JOHN BLACKBURN**. *Broken Boy*. A novel. Secker & Warburg, 'Knockout Thriller' series 1959. First edition. 8vo. 191pp + [i] advertisement. Edges and endpapers lightly speckled, encroaching just a fraction of the upper margins of occasional text leaves. A very good copy in very good pictorial dust wrapper featuring a splendidly lurid design, with a tiny hint of wear to several corner tips and a trace of dust soiling to the rear panel. The author's third novel. £55
- 27. **THOMAS BLACKBURN**. *The Outer Darkness*. The Hand and Flower Press, 'Poems in Pamphlet' series, Aldington 1951. First edition of his first book. This copy **inscribed by the author** on the title page and dated 1951. Slim 8vo. Stapled card wrappers, the staples rusted and partially defective, and the wrappers lightly rubbed and creased at the yapped edges. A nice crisp copy of this collection of twenty-five poems. £55

- 28. **ROBERT BLOOMFIELD**. Rural Tales, Ballads and Songs. Printed for Vernor & Hood and Longman and Rees by T.Bensley 1802. First edition. 8vo. xi, 105pp + [i] contents. In a handsome binding of blue leather, with marbled paper sides and new endpapers. With a portrait frontispiece and various engraved decorations. A small nick to the backstrip leather, and just a trace of very light wear to the corner tips. Some occasional soiling and (mostly) marginal marking, and a short tear to the base of six or seven text leaves. Very good. The Suffolk labouring class poet's second book: an introductory verse followed by eighteen poems most of which were composed in the two year period between the completion and publication of his celebrated debut *The Farmer's Boy* (1800). £75

The first English-language edition. 8vo. Cloth lightly marked and spotted, with further spotting to the edges, endpapers and occasional margins. A nice copy in very good dust wrapper. £15
- 31. **WILLIAM BOYD**. Sweet Caress. The Many Lives of Amory Clay. A novel. Bloomsbury 2015. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. ix, 447pp. A fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper, with a tiny trace of creasing to the spine panel ends. £25
- 32. **CHRISTY BROWN**. Come Softly to My Wake. The Poems of Christy Brown. Secker & Warburg 1971. First edition. Slim 8vo. viii, 51pp. Former owner name and date inked to the head of the front free endpaper, else a fine copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, with a little toning to the spine panel and a touch more to the margins of the front panel. Thirty-seven poems; the author's first collection of verse. £40
- 33. **LORD BYRON**. *Byron's Letters and Journals*. Edited by Leslie A.Marchand. Complete in twelve volumes. John Murray 1973-1982. First editions. 8vo. Uniform red cloth with the top edges stained red (and fractionally faded in places). Colour or monochrome frontispiece to each volume. Neat embossed or inkstamped initials of a former owner to the base of the front endpaper of five volumes. A virtually fine set in dust wrappers, two of which exhibit a light but lengthy crease to the spine panel, and one some further creasing to the head of the spine panel. An excellent set of the first unbowdlerized collected edition of all of Byron's known letters, including over twice as many as the Rowland Prothero turn-of-the-century edition. The first eleven volumes covering the period 1798-1824, with the twelfth volume providing an anthology of memorable passages and a general and subject index for the whole. £250
- 34. **J.L.CARR**. *The Harpole Report*. Secker & Warburg 1972. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 163pp. Top edge very lightly spotted, else a fine copy in dust wrapper, with a small area of scoring to the front panel. Laid-in is a printed slip noting that Carr will be giving a talk at the Annual General Meeting of the Friends of Bishop Stopford School on 13th January 1976 where presumably this copy was signed. The author's third novel, in-part inspired by his near-forty year teaching career (and accordingly a staff room classic). £350
- 35. **CHARLES CAUSLEY**. *Johnny Alleluia*. Poems. Rupert Hart-Davis 1961. First edition. Poet and critic **Anthony Thwaite's copy**, with his surname pencilled to the head of the front free endpaper. Slim 8vo. 61pp. Pictorial paper-covered boards. A trace of very light spotting to the edges. Very good indeed in pictorial dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel, and with a single tiny nick. Thirty-two poems, the author's fourth collection of verse. £15

- 36. **ANGELA CARTER**. An Introduction to Expletives Deleted. Selected Writings. [no publisher], 1991. Slim 8vo. 8pp stapled into glossy card wrappers. In fine state. A most uncommon item probably the last standalone publication issued in her lifetime and presumably produced to promote the forthcoming selection of Carter's non-fiction writings Expletives Deleted, which eventually appeared a few months after her death. The version of the introduction which appeared in the eventual book includes a final paragraph which does not appear here, where Carter laments the Salman Rushdie fatwa (a brief by very moving statement, penned as it was whilst she awaited her own death sentence). £75
- 37. **ANGELA CARTER**. Expletives Deleted. Selected Writings. Selected and with an introduction by the author. Chatto & Windus 1992. First edition. 8vo. 224pp. A fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper, very lightly creased at the head of the spine panel. A comprehensive collection of the author's dramatic writings, much of it hitherto unprinted. Includes vigorous reworkings for radio of *Puss in Boots, Red Riding Hood* and the *Dracula* legend, a draft for an opera of *Orlando*, fictionalised biographies of Richard Dadd and Ronald Firbank, a version of Wedekind's *Lulu*, and screenplays for *The Magic Toyshop* and *The Company of Wolves*. £30

First edition. **Essentially the dedication copy** with a fulsome printed dedication to the poet Henry Austin Dobson, plus also a signed 1903 New Year greetings card from Egerton Castle pasted to the free endpaper, alongside the bookplate of Alban Gobson, Austin Dobson's son, a printed "From Austin Dobson's Library" slip and a second printed slip stating: "Collection D. Books containing references to Austin Dobson". 8vo. xxiii, 302pp + [i] publisher's advertisement. With a frontispiece illustration, a title page decoration, and seventeen illustrations in the text, all by Fred Pegram. Some discolouration to the cloth at the backstrip, the tip of one corner bumped, and a little rubbing and wear to the backstrip ends, the rear outer hinge, and several other extremities. A little sporadic, mostly marginal fox spotting. A good sound copy of this sequel to the husband-and-wife duo's 1900 novel *The Bath Comedy*, considerably enhanced by these attributes. £125

Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. With a frontispiece, six plates, all bar one with a loose unprinted tissue protector, and four decorations in the text, all by Vera Willoughby. A touch of very light spotting to the free endpapers, and the tip of a single corner fractionally bumped. Very good indeed. It was briefly withdrawn after the scandal of Wilde's trial, but was widely reprinted in the US and later on in the UK, with the author's name revealed. £200

Sixteen declare neutrality including Robert Byron, Norman Douglas, T.S.Eliot, Ezra Pound ("Questionnaire an escape mechanism for young fools who are two cowardly to think"), H.G.Wells and Vita Sackville-West, and there are only a handful of contrarians including Edmund Blunden, Arthur Machen, and Evelyn Waugh ("If I were a Spaniard I should be fighting for General Franco...I am not a Fascist nor shall I become one unless it were the only alternative to Marxism". Oh, Evelyn!). An American equivalent was produced a year later, and this pamphlet inspired subsequent polemics on the Vietnam and Falklands Wars. £500
