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Introductory Note

Back in the autumn we found ourselves in Montenegro, touring the Bay of Kotor (although ‘touring’ is a rather grandiose term for journeying via public bus). We’d arrived somewhere close to our destination via car, plane, taxi and ferry (I’d been looking forward to “*Europe’s prettiest ferry journey*”, it didn’t disappoint on that score, but it was probably Europe’s shortest ferry ride too, which somewhat curtailed my scenery-gazing). Next up was the bus. We had some trouble pinpointing the bus stop, and having been journeying since 2:30 that morning decided it might be time for a pint in a local hostelry, wherein we were confident of receiving directions, or at least a description of what a Montenegrin bus stop might look like. The only place within sight was a proper dive, the sort of place even I would usually avoid. Utterly deserted, peeling paint, and a distinctly unloved quality; much, much better days had certainly been seen. The owner turned out to be a delightful man, we bonded over his ancient dribbly cat and the fact that his English was infinitely superior to our Serbo-Croat (I’m doing well if I can order beer, but occasionally this results in unintended Baileys. And nobody ever wants Baileys). The owner introduced himself to us as The Sea Captain, and immediately took us on a short tour of the extensive photographic portraits of his ancestors which adorned the walls, all previous owners of the bar and, so far as we could tell, all also called The Sea Captain. He then told us that he was a philatelist. I have a mental block with this word, stamps or butterflies? I can never remember which. Fellatio, perhaps? His English was good, but not, I felt, so good that this could be anything other than an error. I nodded, smiling blankly, wondering with some trepidation what in fact he might be (earlier the taxi driver had smilingly told us that the place we were going to had ‘murdered tourists’, but on reflection we decided ‘many tourists’ was probably the intended conversational gambit). Noting my confusion, The Sea Captain rummaged behind the bar and produced a hefty and really quite elegantly produced self-published book, and blow me down he *was* a philatelist. It seemed he had one of the finest stamp collections in private hands in the world, and the book showed him winning gold medal after gold medal in seemingly every major stamp convention. He had toured the planet with his collection of Napoleonic letters, eventually retiring to the family bar and the increasingly moist cat (possibly of Napoleonic origin too). We spent several hours nattering to him and leafing through his book together. We were the only customers in all that time, although one more cat did eventually emerge from inside an old half-full bag of cement. The Sea Captain was a serendipitous find, an absolute delight housed in a most unexpected setting. And he knew where the bus stop was.

1. **JAMES AGEE.** *A Death in the Family*. A novel. Victor Gollancz 1958. First UK edition. 8vo. 339pp. A touch of darkening to the paperstock. A very bright and crisp copy in dust wrapper with some not inconsiderable tanning and staining to the spine panel, and just a hint of wear to the head of the spine. The uncommon UK edition of the author's celebrated posthumously-issued autobiographical novel, edited from his incomplete manuscript by David McDowell, and winner of the 1958 Pulitzer Prize. £20
2. **RICHARD ALDINGTON** contributes his poem *Dancers* to an issue of the periodical *Poetry Magazine of Verse*. Vol. V, No. 5, February 1915. Edited by Harriet Monroe. First edition. Slim 8vo. Card wrappers, very lightly chipped at the spine ends and with just a touch of light dust soiling. A very good copy. £15
3. **MONICA ALI.** *Brick Lane*. Doubleday 2003. First edition of her Booker Prize shortlisted debut novel. This copy **inscribed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 413pp. A small bump to the head of the upper board, and a sliver of discolouration to the base. A very crisp copy in dust wrapper, with some creasing to the upper edge and with a small area of surface scoring to the front panel (also discernable on the upper board). £10
4. **ERIC AMBLER.** *To Catch a Spy. An Anthology of Favourite Spy Stories*. Selected and edited by Eric Ambler. The Bodley Head 1964. First edition. 8vo. 224pp. Edges lightly spotted. A virtually fine copy in very good dust wrapper, lightly darkened at the extreme edges and with a little spotting to the margins of the rear panel. A sixteen page introductions precedes a selection of works by John Buchan (*The Loathly Opposite*), Somerset Maugham (*Giulia Lazzari*), Compton Mackenzie (*The First Courier*), Graham Greene (*I Spy*), Ian Fleming (*A View to a Kill*), Michael Gilbert (*On Slay Down*) and Ambler's own *Belgrade* 1926. £50
5. **SHERWOOD ANDERSON.** *Winesburg Ohio. Intimate Histories of Every-day People*. Jonathan Cape 1922. The first UK edition of the author's most celebrated book; issued three years earlier in the US. 8vo. 303pp. Spine ends gently rubbed and the top edge dust soiled. A tiny bump impacts the fore edge of the first four leaves, leaving a miniscule indentation. A very good copy. No dust wrapper. The subtitle of this English edition differs from that of the US issue, which was "A Group of Tales of Ohio Small Town Life". Sheehy & Lohf 10. £55
6. **SHERWOOD ANDERSON.** *Horses and Men. Tales, Long and Short, from Our American Life*. Jonathan Cape 1924. The first UK edition, issued a year earlier in the US. 8vo. xiii + 347pp. Top edge a little dust marked, and with just a touch of rubbing to the spine ends and a small bump to the tip of one corner. Some light browning and toning to the free endpapers. A nice crisp copy. No dust wrapper. A brief foreword by the author and the two-page *Dreiser* (the collection is dedicated to Theodore Dreiser) precedes nine stories; the author's third collection of short fiction. 7. **ANTHOLOGY.** *Wayfarer's Love. Contributions From Living Poets*. Edited by The Duchess of Sutherland. Constable 1904. First edition of this handsome anthology. Large 8vo. 78pp. Decorated cloth featuring a handsome Walter Crane gilt-stamped design. All edges rough-trimmed. A little chafing to the spine ends and corner tips. An inked former owner gift inscription partly erased from the front free endpaper. A very good copy of a handsome production, produced in aid of the Potteries and Newcastle Cripples Guild. A three-page introduction by the editor precedes poems by John Masefield (*Bring Her Friend*), W.B. Yeats (*Old Memory*, a hitherto unprinted poem), Thomas Hardy (*Life's Opportunity*), G.K. Chesterton (*Secrecy*, a hitherto unprinted and subsequently uncollected poem), A.E., Edmund Gosse, A.E. Housman, Robert Bridges, Laurence Binyon, Alice Meynell, Francis Thompson, Maurice Maeterlinck, Sturge Moore, Arthur Symons, Maurice Baring, Wilfred Scawen Blunt, Henry Newbolt and others. Wade 302, Sullivan 214, Not noted by Simmons. £75

8. **MICHAEL AYRTON.** *The Testament of Daedalus.* With a foreword by Rex Warner. Methuen. 1962. First edition. 8vo. 71pp + xvi plates. Marbled paper-covered boards. Illustrated with sixteen plates and with a further eleven pen and brush drawings in the text. Two tiny splashes of staining to the top edge, else a fine copy in dust wrapper, lightly chafed and nicked at the spine ends and corner tips, and with some uneven but fairly light browning. Former owner name neatly inked to the front free endpapers. £15
9. **MICHAEL AYRTON.** *The Maze Maker.* A novel. Longmans 1967. First edition. 8vo. 282pp. A slightly dusty copy, the boards a little marked and with a minor slant to the binding. A little spotting and two small areas of tape residue marking to the front free endpaper, which also exhibits inked details of a former owner. Relevant newspaper clippings pasted to the rear endpaper. A bright copy in the handsome double-spread Ayrton-designed dust wrapper, rubbed and a little nicked at the spine ends and corner tips. £10
10. **BERYL BAINBRIDGE.** *Every Man for Himself.* Duckworth 1996. First edition – this copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. 224pp. A fine copy in fine dust wrapper. The author's Whitbread Prize-winning Titanic disaster novel. £30
11. **JOHN BANVILLE.** *Doctor Copernicus.* A novel. Secker & Warburg 1976. First edition. 8vo. 242pp. Top edge lightly dust soiled and speckled, and with a sliver of discolouration to the head and base of the boards, a touch of very light spotting to the endpapers and a small area of surface abrasion at the head of the rear pastedown. A very good copy in very good dust wrapper, with a little light uneven fading to the unprinted rear panel, alongside several areas of minor indeterminate abrasion. Two tiny slivers of surface abrasion from the base of the spine panel, presumably caused when the New Fiction Society label was carefully removed. Winner of the James Tait Black Memorial Prize, and the first volume in the author's *Revolutions* trilogy. £85
12. **GEORGE BARKER** contributes his lengthy three-part poem *A Vision of Beasts and Gods* (appearing here four years before the first bookform appearance) to the seventh issue of the literary journal *Botteghe Oscure* Vol. VII, Rome 1951. First edition. Royal 8vo. 475pp. Card wrappers, lightly marked and with a little creasing to the yapped fore edges. Some aging to the paperstock. A nice crisp copy. This issue also includes original contributions by Truman Capote (the first chapter of his in-progress novel *The Grass Harp*), Albert Camus, Vernon Watkins, Ronald Duncan, John Lehmann, Arthur Waley, Randall Jarrell, Richard Eberhart &c. £30
13. **H.E.BATES.** *A Threshing Day.* A story. W and G.Foyle Ltd. 1931. First edition, limited to 300 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #289). Slim 8vo. 32pp. Buckram, the backstrip lightly faded and with just a little darkening to the front free endpapers and the merest hint of wear to two corner tips. A very good copy, lacking the unprinted glassine protector. The first bookform appearance of this twenty-six page Bates story, which first appeared in a 1930 issue of *John O'London's Weekly* (under the title *A Threshing Day for Esther*), and was subsequently included in the collection *The Black Boxer Tales* (1932). £125
14. **H.E.BATES.** *The Duet.* Grayson & Grayson, 'The Grayson Books' series 1935. First edition, limited to 285 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #127). Slim 8vo. With decorated vellum endpapers and two small drawings by Joy Lloyd. A virtually fine copy. No dust wrapper. The first of The Grayson Books (the series eventually ran to a total of twelve). £55
15. **H.E.BATES.** *Something Short and Sweet.* Stories. Jonathan Cape 1937. First edition. 8vo. 288pp + [viii] publisher's catalogue at rear. Spine ends and lower edges rubbed, with a touch of spotting to the endpapers and to occasional leaf margins. A nice crisp copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, somewhat marked, soiled, creased and edgeworn, with half a dozen quite small areas of edge loss, and a ring stain to the rear panel. An uncommon collection of sixteen stories, with a printed dedication to H.A.Manhood. 2,000 copies were printed. £75

16. **H.E.BATES.** *The Day of Glory.* A Play in Three Acts. Michael Joseph 1945. First edition – a presentation copy, **inscribed by the author** to his sometime literary agent: “*Margery Vosper, to whom this play owes, if not its heart, the larger part of its head; & who would say that the head did not matter? With warm wishes, thanks & [indecipherable] H.E.Bates, 45*”. Slim 8vo. 78pp. A very good copy, albeit printed on lesser quality wartime paperstock, in slightly tanned, stained and dust soiled dust wrapper. The author’s only significant play, an RAF story that was produced in Salisbury in October 1945, broadcast by the BBC and later toured by the Arts Council. Margery Vosper, of Margery Vosper Ltd., was a rep actress and later manager of the literary agency Dorothy Allen Ltd. Upon her retirement Allen later gifted the agency to Vosper on the understanding that she rename it after herself. £200

17. **SAMUEL BECKETT.** *Samuel Beckett.* The catalogue of a 1971 exhibition at Reading University Library (and later touring), compiled by James Knowlson, with a foreword by A.J. Leventhal. Turret Books 1971. First edition, the card wrapper issue. 8vo. 123pp. Glossy card wrappers. Illustrated with eight photographs and manuscript reproductions. A single light but lengthy readership crease to the spine, else a virtually fine copy of this 385-item catalogue which surveys the whole life of the Nobel Laureate. £15

18. **ALAN BENNETT.** *Keeping On Keeping On.* Faber and Profile books 2016. First edition of the author’s third collection of diary extracts, covering the period 2005-2015 and encompassing the release of the films *The History Boys* and *The Lady in the Van*. 8vo. 721pp. With patterned endpapers and thirty photographs, mostly in colour. A small indentation to the head of the rear board and just a trace of wear to the spine ends. A virtually fine copy in dust wrapper, with just a touch of light wear to the extremities. £10

19. **JOHN BETJEMAN.** **Julian Fane.** *A Letter.* With a brief foreword by John Betjeman. John Murray, 1960. The deluxe issue of the first edition, one of an unspecified [in fact 25] number of specially bound numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #22). 8vo. 58pp. Cloth-backed decorated paper boards. Top edge gilt. In fine state. No dust wrapper called for, but with the original unprinted tissue protector. The author’s second book (Betjeman had written a glowing review of his inaugural effort, *Morning*). £50

20. **JOHN BETJEMAN.** **Reece Winstone.** *Bristol Fashion.* With photographs by the author and a one-page preface by John Betjeman. Designed and published by Reece Winstone, [Bristol] 1968. First edition. 4to. 80pp. Publisher’s laminated boards, complete with the original perforated order leaf at the rear. A very good copy. £15

21. **BLOOMSBURY.** **Isabelle Anscombe.** *Omega and After. Bloomsbury and the Decorative Arts.* With photographs by Howard Grey and a foreword by John Lehmann. Thames & Hudson 1981. First edition. 4to. 176pp. Illustrated with over 120 photographs and reproductions, including twenty in colour. Faint ghost of a few pencil marks to the front free endpaper, else a fine copy in laminated dust wrapper with a small kink to the upper edge. *Will you help save Charleston?* Folding handbill laid-in. Chapters include *Roger Fry and the foundation of the Omega Workshop*, *Vanessa Bell and the development of an idea*, and *The Ending of the Omega*. £30

22. **EDMUND BLUNDEN.** **Robert Lloyd.** *The Actor. A Poem by Robert Lloyd to which is prefix’d An Essay by Edmund Blunden. The whole embellish’d with Theatrical Figures by Randolph Schwabe.* C.W.Beaumont 1926 (in fact dated at the base of the title leaf MDCCCCXXVI [sic]). First edition, this being number 203 of 210 copies printed on handmade paper (from a total edition of 270). Slim 8vo. 45pp. Decorated paper-covered buckram-backed boards. A sliver of light discolouration to the board edges and just a hint of rubbing to the corner tips. A very good copy of a typically delightful Beaumont Press production. No dust wrapper called for, but lacking the original unprinted tissue protector (but with a fresh sheet of protective acetate supplied). £35

23. **EDMUND BLUNDEN.** *Memorial Window to Edmund Blunden 1896-1974 in the Church of St. Peter & St. Paul, Yalding, Kent.* [no publisher / no date, c.1979]. A single sheet of card, folded to form four leaves, and with a reproduction of Laurence Whistler's splendid stained glass window tipped to the third leaf. Includes a brief description of Blunden and the window, followed by his poem *Report on Experience*. A touch of very light superficial creasing. A very good copy of an uncommon item. £30
24. **RUPERT BROOKE. Arthur Stringer.** *Red Wine of Youth. A Life of Rupert Brooke.* With illustrations. Bobbs-Merrill, Indianapolis & New York 1948. First edition (never issued in the UK). 8vo. 287pp. Spine ends lightly rubbed and with just a trace of discolouration to the board edges. The text 'Rupert Brooke' has been neatly inked to the backstrip. Former owner name and sticker to the front free endpaper, and a quotation from Michel de Montaigne inked to the front pastedown. A nice bright copy in dust wrapper, slightly nicked, chipped and dust soiled. £25
25. **RUPERT BROOKE. Michael Hastings.** *The Handsomest Young Man in England: Rupert Brooke.* Michael Joseph 1967. First edition. 4to. 235pp. A very good copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, a little sunned and dust soiled. Former owner bookplate to the front free endpaper, and the signature of a second owner inked to the front pastedown (and almost entirely obscured by the wrapper flap). A study of the life and work of Rupert Brooke, illustrated with nearly 250 photographs and letter & manuscript reproductions. £25
26. **RUPERT BROOKE.** *The Letters of Rupert Brooke.* Edited by Sir Geoffrey Keynes. Faber 1968. First edition. 8vo. xv + 709pp. Illustrated with nineteen photographic plates. In fine state with virtually fine dust wrapper. Former owner bookplate to the front free endpaper. A substantial selection of Brooke's correspondence, much of it hitherto unprinted, with recipients including Virginia Woolf, Edward Marsh, Stanley Spencer, E.M.Forster, Lascelles Abercrombie, John Drinkwater, W.W.Gibson, Edmund Gosse, Harold Monro, Gwen Raverat, Lytton Strachey, Albert Rothenstein and Edward Thomas. £25
27. **MAURICE BROWNE.** *Songs of Exile.* Poems. Samurai Press, Norwich 1907. First edition – an interesting association copy, **inscribed by the publisher:** "Rev Canon Rawnsley, from A[rthur] K.S[abin], *The Author's Friend. Dunsfold, Godalming 16/vii.1907*", and with an accompanying hand-written letter from Sabin to Rawnsley laid-in ("I am sending you a copy of my own first-issued book...the Press will pay ultimately I think: and it is very pleasant to be having a real struggle on decent ground"). Slim 8vo. 32pp. Stiff card boards, the backstrip nicked and splitting, and the corner tips rubbed. Issued without endpapers and accordingly with some browning to the half-title and the final text leaf. Very good. Nine poems by the noted theatre producer, perhaps best known as the producer of R.C.Sherriff's *Journey's End*. Arthur Sabin became involved in Harold Monro's Samurai Press in circa 1906, after it moved from Norwich to Cranleigh. He later owned the imprint Temple Sheen Press, was later Keeper at the Victoria and Albert Museum and curator of the Bethnal Green Museum (now the Museum of Childhood). Canon Hardwicke Rawnsley was one of three founders of the National Trust: he owned Allan Bank, a house once variously occupied by William and Dorothy Wordsworth, Thomas De Quincey, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, and bequeathed it to the National Trust. £50
28. **HELEN CARR.** *The Verse Revolutionaries: Ezra Pound, H.D. and The Imagists.* Jonathan Cape 2009. First edition. Large 8vo. 982pp. Illustrated with photographs and reproductions. A fine copy in dust wrapper, with a little light uneven fading to the edges. £15
29. **WILLIAM COBBETT. George Spater.** *William Cobbett. The Poor Man's Friend.* Cambridge University Press 1982. First edition, complete in two volumes. 8vo. 653pp (over both volumes). Map-illustrated endpapers. With illustrations. A virtually fine set in dust wrappers, lightly faded at the spine panels. Covers a little spotted and top edges speckled. Good, bright copies in dust wrappers, faded at spine panels and lightly nicked at some extremities. £20

30. **JEAN COCTEAU.** *A Call to Order. Essays.* Translated from the French by Rollo H. Myers. Faber & Gwyer 1926. The first English edition of this collection of six essays written between 1918-26 and including *Cock and Harlequin* and *Professional Secrets*. 8vo. 248pp. Self-portraiture frontispiece drawing. A touch of wear to the spine ends, the top edge spotted, and one or two preliminary and concluding leaves also lightly spotted. A nice crisp copy. No dust wrapper. £50
31. **JOSEPH CONRAD.** *The Mirror of the Sea. Memories and Impressions.* Methuen 1906. First edition, first state. 8vo. vii + 306pp + xl publisher's catalogue dated August 1906. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. The spine ends a little rubbed and nicked, with some wear to the corner tips and a little miscellaneous marking and discolouration to the cloth. Preliminary and concluding leaves lightly spotted, with a touch of further occasional soiling to leaf margins. A nice crisp copy. 1,500 copies were printed. £225
32. **A.E. COPPARD.** *Easter Day.* A poem. [no publisher / no date, circa 1931]. Tall 8vo. Four pages of printed text. Cloth-backed boards, lettered in red at the upper board. Coppard's four-page holograph poem, issued here in an unspecified limited edition [apparently 145, with 35 copies for presentation], this copy hand-numbered 114 and with an additional short poem (or possibly the conclusion to the facsimile poem) hand-written by the author on the recto of the final leaf: "*I comb & comb & comb at the spicy moss, / all day I am pleasantly toiling, / and the red umbrella lies on the lawn / unfolded. A.E. Coppard, Oct. 1931*". Spine ends a little bruised and with a touch of light wear to the corner tips. Former owner inkstamp to the front pastedown. A very good copy of a most uncommon item, housed in the original stiff card slipcase, a little rubbed, chafed and dust soiled. £75
33. **MALCOLM COWLEY.** *A Second Flowering. Works and Days of the Lost Generation.* Andre Deutsch 1973. The first UK edition. 8vo. x + 276pp. A hint of spotting to the fore edge, else a fine copy in virtually fine price-clipped dust wrapper. A further account of the Lost Generation, with chapters focusing on F. Scott Fitzgerald, Ernest Hemingway, John Dos Passos, E.E. Cummings, Thornton Wilder, William Faulkner, Thomas Wolfe and Hart Crane. £10
34. **MALCOLM COWLEY.** *The View From 80.* The Viking Press, New York 1980. First edition. Slim 8vo. 74pp. Cloth-backed boards. A fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. A reflection from the author's ninth decade, considerably expanded from his award-winning *Life* magazine article. £15
35. **MALCOLM COWLEY.** *Exile's Return. A Literary Odyssey of the 1920's.* With an introduction by Leon Edel and illustrated with contemporary photographs. The Limited Editions Club, New York 1981. First edition thus, one of 2,000 numbered copies (this being #1813) **signed by both the author and the photographer Berenice Abbott.** Tall 8vo. 281pp. Cloth-backed decorated paper-covered boards. Illustrated with twelve full-page photogravures by Abbott, Man Ray, André Kertész, Alvin Coburn and Walker Evans. A fine copy in slipcase, lacking the original unprinted glassine protector, but with a fresh sheet supplied. The first signed limited edition of Cowley's celebrated lyrical memoir of the Lost Generation (first published in 1934, and here including the author's prologue and epilogue which he wrote for the revised edition of 1951). £75
36. **HART CRANE.** *Sherman Paul. Hart's Bridge.* University of Illinois Press, Urbana 1972. First edition. 8vo. 315pp. A touch of spotting to the top edge, and the front endpapers very lightly marked. A virtually fine copy in dust wrapper, a little chafed in places and with a touch of wear to the spine ends and corner tips. A reassessment of Crane's life and work, with a special focus on his ambitious lengthy poem *The Bridge*. £10

37. **CRIMEAN WAR. Mrs Tom Kelly [i.e. Mary Kelly].** *From the Fleet in the Fifties. A History of the Crimean War.* With letters written between 1854-56 by The Reverend S.Kelson Stothert, chaplain to the Naval Brigade. With illustrations by William Simpson, various maps and photographs, and a preface by Vice-Admiral [Armand Temple] Powlett. Hurst & Blackett 1902. First edition, this copy **inscribed by the author, Mary Kelly**, and with a contemporary eight-page letter to the recipients of her inscription laid-in. 8vo. 460pp. Quarter-cloth. With a tissue-protected colour frontispiece and twenty-eight captioned monochrome plates, two of them folding. Errata slip tipped between pp 4448-449, as issued. A little creasing and light wear to the spine ends and some spotting to two or three preliminary and concluding leaves. Many leaves uncut at the top edge. A very good copy of this diplomatic and military history of the Crimean War, built around the detailed letters to family members of Kelson Stothert (Kelson Stothert was in Crimean waters, mostly on board the HMS Queen, between April 1854 and early January 1855, and between mid-April and early October 1855. He also describes visits to Balaklava and the British camp, and also Sevastopol in mid-September 1855). In the laid-in letter Mary Kelly discusses her depiction of the Battle of Balaklava (chapter xvii) and the Royal Patriotic Fund set up to provide assistance to the widows and orphans of the Crimean War. £95
38. **KEVIN CROSSLEY-HOLLAND.** *The Language of Yes.* Poems. Enitharmon Press 1996. First edition, the deluxe casebound issue, limited to just thirty numbered copies, **signed by the author** and including a hand-written poem. Slim 8vo. 72pp. Cloth with a decorated paper plate inset to the upper board. Four or five very light instances of spotting to the cloth and just a speckling of spotting to the top edge. A virtually fine copy. No dust wrapper called for. Forty-one poems. £75
39. **E.E.CUMMINGS.** A special E.E.Cummings issue of the quarterly periodical *The Harvard Wake*. No 5, spring 1946. 8vo. The magazine gently morphed into an agricultural publication (Duncan took up farming a year after the first issue was published), its frequency of publication altering over time, eventually resulting in a name change to *The Scythe*. This batch of five issues includes the first to appear under that name, and it would appear, confusingly, that it and at least two others were also made available under the old title too. Williamson's contribution appears in the first issue here (No. 16, May 1942), and was the first of his total of six contributions. £125
