I won't bore you with the minutia of unpacking, assembling and arranging – you've all done it at least once. Nor will I indulge too heavily in stories of woeful DIY (is there another kind?), but my efforts on Day Two to replace a toilet seat did necessitate an emergency plumber, thereby proving, were proof needed, that I'm my father's son (as it happens, whilst the plumber was engaged in correcting my, let's call them "efforts", water started pouring through the kitchen ceiling – not me this time – so his presence was doubly useful). I suspect we're some years away from eradicating the mostly god-awful decoration choices we now live amongst (who wallpapers ceilings?) but at least we now have a garden; and because we've had no opportunity to make it otherwise, it's currently quite a nice garden.

A week or so after we moved in, I was chatting to one of the neighbours: "*I understand you're a writer*" she said, with a fair degree of enthusiasm. "*No, I'm a bookseller*" I confessed. She didn't miss a beat, replying immediately: "*That's disappointing*". 'nuff said.

- 1. **FLEUR ADCOCK**. *The Eye of the Hurricane*. Poems. A.H. & A.W.Reed, Wellington, New Zealand 1964. First edition of the author's first book. Slim 8vo. 46pp. Top edge and free endpapers lightly spotted, some browning to the half-title and to one blank concluding leaf, and an area of very faint surface marking to the upper board. Very good in dust wrapper, lightly toned at the spine panel and with a tiny hint of edgewear. Thirty-five poems. There was no equivalent UK edition (her first book to be published in England was *Tigers* in 1967). £50
- 2. **A.E. [i.e. George William Russell].** *Vale and Other Poems.* Macmillan 1931. First edition. 8vo. viii, 56pp. Free endpapers and several preliminary and concluding leaves spotted. The half-title and final text leaf browned. A very good copy. No dust wrapper. Thirty-four poems, with a printed dedication to fellow Irish poet Seumus O'Sullivan. £10
- 3. LASCELLES ABERCROMBIE. Speculative Dialogues. Martin Secker 1913. First edition, published the year after Abercrombie relocated to the Gloucestershire village of Dymock. This copy from the library of 'Friend to the Poets' John Wilton Haines, with his signature and address details pencilled to the front free endpaper. 8vo. 203pp + [iv] publisher's advertisements. Second state binding of brown cloth with a tanned and slightly chipped paper spine label. Cloth lightly rubbed at several extremities. Tiny dealer plate to the base of the rear pastedown. Foreand bottom edges spotted, with some further spotting to twenty or so preliminary leaves, and sporadically thereafter. A good, sound copy. Eight dialogues: *Famine and Pestilence, Minos and a Ghost, A Beggar and His Dog, Earth and a Crowd, Lust and Love, Science and the World, Philosophy and the Angel*, and *Time and Eternity*. - 4. **LASCELLES ABERCROMBIE**. *The Sale of Saint Thomas. In Six Acts.* Martin Secker 1930. First edition, limited to 480 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #9). Tall 8vo. 124pp. Buckram. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. The buckram a little faded at the backstrip, and a little marked, chafed and discoloured in places. Free endpapers browned. A very good copy. No dust wrapper called-for. The first edition of the author's complete verse-play (the first act was originally privately printed in 1911; the subsequent five acts appear in print here for the first time). Cooper 31. £45
- 5. **DANNIE ABSE**. *Ash on a Young Man's Sleeve*. A novel. Hutchinson 1954. First edition. 8vo. 200pp. Edges very lightly spotted, and with some partial toning and spotting to the free endpapers. A nice bright copy in nicked, chipped, torn and dust soiled pictorial dust wrapper. The author's third book and first non-verse work, an account of childhood based in part on his own life. £30
- 6. **DOUGLAS ADAMS.** So Long, and Thanks for All the Fish. Pan Books 1984. First edition. This copy **inscribed by the author** on the title page with a brief Christmas greeting and dated the year of publication. 8vo. 191pp. A tiny bump to the head of the upper board, and four inkstamped numerals to the base of the front free endpaper. Very good indeed in price-clipped dust wrapper with the inset holographic decoration to the front panel; the wrapper lightly rubbed and dust soiled, with a tiny indeterminate splash of white to the base of the spine. The fourth volume of the author's increasingly misnamed *Hitch Hiker's Trilogy*. £275
- 7. ALAIN-FOURNIER. *Meaulnes. The Lost Domain.* Translated from the French of *Le Grand Meaulnes* by Sandra Morris. Blackie, 'Chosen Books from Abroad' series 1966. The first edition of this new English translation. 8vo. viii, 212pp. A narrow strip of toning to one preliminary and one concluding leaf, and a former owner name neatly inked to the front pastedown (almost entirely obscured by the wrapper flap). Very good indeed in the pictorial dust wrapper designed by David Knight, a little rubbed at the extremities and natural folds, with several tiny areas of loss and several short tears with accompanying creasing. Publisher's price sticker over the original price printed to the base of the front flap. £35

- 8. **MARTIN AMIS**. *Success*. A novel. Jonathan Cape 1978. First edition. 8vo. 224pp. In fine state with virtually fine dust wrapper, with perhaps a shade of fading to the spine panel colouring. The author's third book. £65
- 9. J.REDWOOD ANDERSON. *The Human Dawn*. A poem. Humphrey Milford, Oxford University Press 1934. First edition. A presentation copy, **inscribed by the author** in June 1943 to fellow poet E.H.Visiak "*to thank him for his* [verse collection] *Medusa*". A subsequent note inked to the front pastedown shows that Visiak later passed it to poet Kenneth Hopkins. There is a little pencilled underlining, and some pencilled notes to the rear endpaper which appear to be in Hopkins' hand. 8vo. vi, 76pp. Fore edge, endpapers and two or three preliminary leaves very lightly spotted. A very good copy in toned, marked and lightly chafed and nicked wrapper. £60
- 10. **JERZY ANDRZEJEWSKI** (writing as 'George Andrzeyevski'). *Ashes and Diamonds*. A novel. Translated from the Polish of *Popiol i Diamant* by D.J.Welsh. Weidenfeld & Nicolson 1962. First UK edition. 8vo. 239pp. Top edge a little spotted and dust soiled, and with just a shade of toning to the free endpapers. Contemporary former owner name and date neatly inked to the head of the front free endpaper. Very good indeed in the handsome pictorial dust wrapper designed by Harry Sida, lightly dust soiled and with a little toning to the spine panel and to the margins of the front and rear panels. The first English edition of the author's most famous book, first published in 1948 and set during the last few days of the Second World War. "*Want to know why the Poles are unchallenged as the hard men of eastern Europe? This staggeringly bleak work about postwar Poland goes a long way to explaining*" Tibor Fischer. £95
- 11. **JERZY ANDRZEJEWSKI** (writing as 'George Andrzeyevski'). *The Gates of Paradise*. A novel. Translated from the Polish of *Bramy raju* by James Kirkup. Weidenfeld & Nicolson 1962. First English edition. 8vo. 158pp. A scattering of light spotting to the top edge and a narrow strip of near-invisible toning to the rear free endpaper. A virtually fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper designed by Michael Hoare. Tiny dealer plate to the front pastedown (obscured by the wrapper flap). A circa 40,000-word novel of the Children's Crusade, written in just two sentences, the second of which is only five words long (*"And they marched all nigh"* which is just four words in the original Polish). The author's third appearance in English. Uncommon, and much more so in the dust wrapper. £175
- 12. **ANTHOLOGY**. A Book of Yale Review Verse. Yale University Press, New Haven and Oxford University Press 1917. First edition. 8vo. ix, 61pp. Parchment-backed paper-covered boards with a paper title label. A Yale University Press bookplate on the front pastedown identifies this as the 'Editorial Copy'. Corner tips gently rubbed. A very good copy in the most uncommon dust wrapper, which is split into two parts at the rear panel-spine panel and with about half of the spine panel absent, and also just a trace of very minor edgewear. An unaccredited editorial foreword precedes poems by Robert Frost (*The Hill Wife*), Bynner Witter, Lindsay Vachel, Amy Lowell, Walter de la Mare, John Masefield, Alfred Noyce, Edward Bliss Reed, Louis Untermeyer and eighteen others, all reproduced from the pages of *The Yale Review*. £50
- 13. **ANTHOLOGY. James Dickey, Paris Leary and Jon Swan**. *Poets of Today VII*. With a twenty-page introductory essay, *Some Thoughts on Poetry*, by John Hall Wheelock. Charles Scribner's Sons, New York 1960. First edition. 8vo. 206pp. A virtually fine copy in very good dust wrapper, lightly chafed at the spine ends and corner tips, and with a little fading to the publisher's red spine panel colouring. This three-hander constitutes **James Dickey's first book**, and includes the entirety of his debut collection *Into the Stone and Other Poems*. Paris Leary contributes his thirty-eight verse collection *Views of the Oxford Colleges and Other Poems*, and Jon Swan contributes his thirty-one verse collection *Journeys and Return*. £55

- 14. **ISAAC ASIMOV**. *The Martian Way and Other Science Fiction Stories*. Dennis Dobson 1964. The first UK edition, issued nine years after the US edition and somewhat more uncommon. 8vo. 222pp. Edges and endpapers spotted, and with just a touch of further spotting to two or three preliminary leaves. A very good copy in good dust wrapper, chafed at the extremities and natural folds, with a small area of staining to the base of the rear panel, and some internal spotting. Almost imperceptible Harrods Library blind-stamp to the base of the rear wrapper flap, yet no other indications of institutional ownership. The author's first collection of short-ish fiction, comprising the novella *Sucker Bait*, and novelettes *The Martian Way, Youth* and *The Deep*. £35
- 15. LADY CYNTHIA ASQUITH. She Walks in Beauty. Descriptions of Feminine Beauty in English Prose and Poetry. Edited by Cynthia Asquith. William Heinemann 1934. First edition. A presentation copy, inscribed by the author on the front free endpaper: "Eddie with love from Cynthia 1934", the recipient of the inscription being Edward Marsh, and with a brief handwritten note from the author laid-in, presenting Marsh with this copy and thanking him for his "invaluable help" with its creation. Several inked and pencilled marginal corrections. 8vo. xvi, 162pp. A little light discolouration to the cloth at the upper board. Edges lightly spotted, and with just a little toning to the free endpapers. A very good copy in somewhat toned, soiled, rubbed and lightly chipped dust wrapper. A six-page introduction precedes a hefty selection of verse and prose. A lovely association copy. £150
- 16. **DAVID ATTENBOROUGH**. *The Zoo Quest Expeditions. Travels in Guyana, Indonesia and Paraguay.* Lutterworth Press 1980. The first omnibus edition of the author's first three books. 8vo. 384pp. Illustrated throughout with colour and monochrome photographs. Tips of two corners gently bumped, and with a little toning to the free endpapers. A very good copy in dust wrapper, with just the tiniest hint of wear to the head of the spine panel. A new eight-page introduction written especially for this omnibus edition precedes the first three volumes of Attenborough's Zoo Quest series (Zoo Quest to Guyana, Zoo Quest for a Dragon and Zoo Quest in Paraguay), originally published between 1956-59 and documenting his animal collecting expeditions around the world. £30
- 17. **MARGARET ATWOOD**. *The Robber Bride*. A novel. Bloomsbury 1993. First UK edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the half-title. 8vo. 470pp. A tiny crease to the tip of the rear free endpaper, else a fine copy in dust wrapper with a tiny hint of near-invisible wear to one or two extremities. £50
- MARGARET ATWOOD. Stone Mattresses. Nine Tales. Bloomsbury 2014. First UK edition. This copy signed by the author on the title page. 8vo. 273pp. A fine copy in fine dust wrapper. Nine stories, including I Dream of Zenia with the Bright Red Teeth which serves as a sequel to her 1993 novel The Robber Bride. £50
- 19. **MARGARET ATWOOD**. *The Testaments*. A novel. Chatto & Windus 2019. First UK edition. 8vo. 419pp. A tiny indentation to the fore edge of the upper board, else a fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper, just fractionally rubbed at one or two extremities. A super copy of the author's Booker Prize winning sequel to *The Handmaid's Tale* (1985). £15
- 20. W.H.AUDEN contributes his poem *Natural Linguistics (for Peter Salus)* the first UK printing of this Auden poem, which was not subsequently collected to the inaugural issue of the periodical *Candelabrum. A Magazine of Poetry.* Vol. 1, No. 1, April 1970. Slim 8vo. 32pp. Stapled card wrappers, just fractionally faded at the margins. "*Publication date: 10 Apr 1970*" inkstamped to the head of the front wrapper. A very good copy. Other contributors include Doris Lessing (her poems *Man Takes Photograph of the Moon, That was Charm That Was,* and *Watchers*), Jack Clemo and Peter Scupham. The uncommon inaugural issue of this long-standing poetry magazine, which was issued twice-yearly between 1970-2010. £35

- 21. **H.E.BATES**. *The Tree*. A story. E.Lahr, 'Blue Moon Booklets' series [1930]. First edition. This copy **signed by the author** on the first leaf. Slim 8vo. 11pp stapled into plain card wrappers. Some uneven browning to the first leaf, suggesting that a clipping was at one point stored here. The staples rusted, and with some very occasional marginal spotting. A very good copy in the blue lettered dust wrapper, split into two parts at the natural fold. A nice signed copy of this early Bates' item, a seven-page story, issued here as #3 of the Blue Moon Booklets series, and never subsequently reprinted. Eads A9. £95
- 22. **H.E.BATES.** *Mrs. Esmond's Life.* A story. Privately Printed (by E.Lahr) 1931. First edition, limited to 300 numbered copies, **signed by the author** (this being #104). 8vo. Buckram with a gilt top edge. Buckram a little marked and dust soiled. Free endpapers very lightly toned and spotted. Former owner bookplate to the front pastedown, alongside a private library sticker. A nice, bright copy. No dust wrapper called for. A twenty-one page short story, which was originally printed in the periodical *The Criterion* under the title *Charlotte Esmond*, and was not subsequently reprinted. Eads A13. £75
- 23. **H.E.BATES**. *The Fallow Land*. A novel. Jonathan Cape 1932. First edition. 8vo. 327pp. Edges lightly spotted, and with just a touch of further spotting to the upper margin of the first three or four leaves, and also to a dozen concluding leaves. A very good copy in price-clipped dust wrapper, tanned at the spine panel, very lightly marked and dust soiled, and with a tiny sliver of loss from the head of the spine panel and a second tiny triangular area of loss from the upper edge. A splendidly preserved copy of the author's fourth novel, of which 2,500 copies were printed. Eads A17. £95
- 24. **H.E.BATES**. *The Story Without an End and The Country Doctor*. Two stories. The White Owl Press 1932. The deluxe issue of the first edition, limited to 130 numbered copies **signed by the author** (this being #67). Tall 8vo. 51pp. Top edge gilt, others untrimmed. With a splendid woodcut frontispiece credited to 'N.K.' which was not included in the standard trade edition, and a second woodcut vignette at the head of the first text leaf. Cloth very lightly marked at one or two extremities, and with a little offsetting from the woodcuts to the adjacent leaves. Free endpapers very lightly toned, and with just a touch of spotting to several preliminary and concluding leaves. A very good copy. No dust wrapper called for. Uncommon. The first printing of these two Bates' stories (the second story was never reprinted). Eads A18. £175
- 25. **H.E.BATES**. *Give Them Their Life. The Poetry of H.E.Bates*. Edited, with an introduction by Peter Eads, a foreword by Richard Bates and calligraphy and illustrations by Lynne Evans. Evensford 1990. First edition, one of a special limited edition of 1000 numbered copies, signed by all three contributors (this being #511). This copy with an additional presentation inscription by Peter Eads. Landscape 4to. 72pp. In fine state with dust wrapper, with several tiny edge-tears and a little chafing to the natural folds. Nineteen poems including four composed for Christmas cards, plus a brief prose piece on John Clare and the text of Bates' four-page review of *The Poems of John Clare*. £35
- 26. **RALPH BATES**. *Sierra*. Stories. Peter Davies 1933. First edition. 8vo. 283pp. Some bruising to the backstrip, the front free endpaper and half-title excised, and with a strip of toning to the title page. A good copy only albeit really very crisp and bright in toned and lightly rubbed dust wrapper. The author's first book, eleven stories about pre civil-war Spain. Uncommon. £25
- 27. **BEAT GENERATION. Harvey Pekar and Ed Piskor.** *The Beats. A Graphic History.* Edited by Paul Buhle. Hill & Wang, New York 2009. First edition. 8vo. viii, 199pp. Top edge lightly spotted, else a fine copy in virtually fine dust wrapper. A graphic novel depicting the history of the Beat Generation, with text by Harvey Pekar, Nancy J.Peters &c., and artwork by Ed Piskor, Jay Kenney, Nick Thorkelson &c. £25

- 28. **SAMUEL BECKETT**. An Anthology of Mexican Poetry. Translated by Samuel Beckett, compiled by Octavio Paz, and with a preface by C.M.Bowra. Thames & Hudson 1958. The uncommon English issue, printed from the sheets of the Indiana University Press edition which was published earlier the same year, and identical to it bar the addition of the Thames & Hudson imprint on the title page, and an expanded copyright statement. 8vo. 213pp. A touch of very light bruising to the spine ends. A virtually fine copy in the US-issue dust wrapper, just a little rubbed at the extremities, and with a touch of dust soiling. A thirteen-page introduction by Bowra, and Paz's lengthy introductory essay *Introduction to the History of Mexican Poetry*, and brief foreword precede one hundred and twenty-four poems and haikus, plus fifteen pages of notes. Beckett's final work of commercial translation. £125
- 29. ALAN BENNETT. *The History Boys.* A play. Faber 2004. First edition the paperback issue. This copy **signed by the author** on the title page. 8vo. xxvii, 109pp. Card wrappers, lightly creased and with a touch of wear to several extremities. A nice crisp copy. £25
- 30. **SVEN BERLIN**. *I am Lazarus*. With eight drawings by the author. The Galley Press 1961. First edition. 8vo. 209pp. With a frontispiece and seven plates, plus a number of diagrams in the text. The edges, backstrip, endpapers, a dozen preliminary leaves and several concluding leaves spotted, and with a little occasional marginal spotting throughout. Former owner name inked to the head of the front free endpaper. A good copy in good dust wrapper featuring a striking design by the author, somewhat rubbed and chafed at the edges and natural folds, and with a little marking and one short biro mark to the rear panel. The author's second book, recounting his Second World War experiences (Berlin originally registered as a conscientious objector, but later renounced that position, joining the Army and taking part in the D-Day landings as a Forward Observer in France, Holland and Belgium). £40
- 31. **JOHN BETJEMAN**. *West Country Churches*. Four Essays. Society of SS Peter and Paul 1973. First edition. Slim 8vo. 19pp. Decorated stapled card wrappers. Illustrated with four black and white plates of photographs and reproductions. In fine state. Three Betjeman essay, all of which were originally published in the *Church Observer* in. £15
- 32. EDMUND BLUNDEN. The Bonadventure. A Random Journal of an Atlantic Holiday. With an introductory letter by H.M.Tomlinson, and a drawing by R[alph] H[odgson] on the final text leaf. Richard Cobden-Sanderson 1922. First edition. A presentation copy, inscribed by the author to his friend, and translator of several of his poems into Japanese, Ichiro Nishizaki: "Inscribed for I Nishizaki in the hope that he may some day make as good a trip and write six times as good a book, by his friend Edmund Blunden, March 18, 1927". Blunden has also annotated the printed dedication to H.W.M. by adding "assingham, of sadly brilliant memory". Beneath Blunden's inscription is a later inscription from Nishizaki presenting the book to P.D.Perkins, the Japanese scholar and author of a bibliography of Lafcadio Hearn. Perkin's bookplate to the front pastedown. 8vo. 192pp. Cloth with a paper spine label, which is tanned and a little chipped. The cloth somewhat marked and rubbed, with some bruising and wear to the backstrip ends and corner tips. Free endpapers a little toned and spotted, with some further uneven toning to the half-title and to the final text leaf. A good copy in marked and dust soiled dust wrapper, with some rubbing and wear to the edges and a two-inch area of loss from the base of the spine (that two-inch portion retained). The author's seventh book, and first non-verse publication; an account of his 1921 voyage to South America ("I am sorry myself that there are no adventures of the blood-curdling sort in it; but I could not go out of my way, nor do tramps find time, it seems, for propitiating cannibals" – from the author's note). £150
- 33. **RONALD BLYTHE**. *A Treasonable Growth*. A novel. MacGibbon & Kee 1960. First edition. 8vo. 286pp. Edges, endpapers and two or three preliminary and concluding leaves spotted. A very good copy in dust wrapper, marred by a tiny hint of edgewear and with a little spotting to the predominantly white rear panel, and internally. The author's first book. Quite scarce. £35

- 34. **HEINRICH BÖLL**. *The Bread of Those Early Years*. A novel. Translated from the German of *Das Brot der Frühen Jahre* by Leila Vennewitz. Secker and Warburg 1976. First edition of this new English-language translation. 8vo. 124pp. A fine copy in lightly rubbed and nicked dust wrapper. A new translation of this early Böll novella, first published in English in 1957, but that version superseded by this new version produced by Böll's authorised translator. £20
- 35. JAMES BOSWELL. Chauncey Brewster Tinker. Young Boswell. Chapters on James Boswell the Biographer, based largely on New Material. With illustrations. Putnam, London / Atlantic Monthly Press, Boston [1922]. The English issue of the first edition. Royal 8vo. 266pp. Portrait frontispiece. Covers bumped at some extremities. A very bright copy. No dust wrapper. £15
- 36. **JAMES BOSWELL. Mary Hyde.** *The Impossible Friendship: Boswell and Mrs. Thrale.* With illustrations. Chatto & Windus 1973. First edition. 188pp. Tall 4to. A very bright copy in dust wrapper, the rear panel lightly marked and with several tiny closed tears. £15
- 37. RUPERT BROOKE. Poèmes. Translated from the English by Y.Vineuil. Guy Lévis Mano, Paris 1947. The first French-language edition, limited to 640 numbered copies (this being #583). Small 8vo. 77pp. Printed card wrappers, with the merest hint of toning to the wrapper margins. All pages uncut at the upper edge. A very good unread copy. Twenty-six poems, printed in English to the versos, with French translations to the adjacent rectos. £50
- 38. **GEORGE MACKAY BROWN** contributes his poems *The Birth* and *He That's Been Young* to an issue of the periodical *Lines Review*. No. 15. Summer 1959. First edition. 8vo. 32pp. Stapled card wrappers, lightly soiled at the rear wrapper. A very good copy. £10
- 39. **GEORGE MACKAY BROWN** contributes his poem *Cough Cure* to an issue of the periodical *Lines Review*. No. 21. Summer 1965. First edition. 8vo. 48pp. Stapled card wrappers, with some spotting to the wrappers and a single short crease to the rear wrapper. A nice bright copy. £10
- 40. **GEORGE MACKAY BROWN** contributes his poems *Jack-in-the Box, Sunk Sailing Boat* and *Carnival* to an issue of the periodical *Lines Review*. No. 22. Winter 1966. First edition. 8vo. 48pp. Stapled card wrappers, with a little uneven fading to the margins. A very good copy. £10
- 41. **GERALD BULLETT**. *Poems in Pencil.* J.M.Dent 1937. First edition, printed by Hague & Gill Ltd. and printed in a run of 600 copies, 500 of which were offered for sale. In 1945, following the failure of his farming venture in Shallowford, Williamson moved back to Ox' Cross and lived there in a caravan with his long-suffering secretary-companion Ann Thomas. In 1949 he married Christine Duffield and after the birth of their son Harry alternate on-site accommodation was essential, leading to the eventual construction of The Studio.
